## **Profiles**

**ALEXANDER ARSENTYEV** (The Duke) In 1994, Mr. Arsentyev enrolled at Moscow Art Theatre School. After graduating, he joined the company of the Moscow Art Theatre. His debut on the professional stage was as Albert in Pushkin's Little Tragedies. He has been acting with the Pushkin Theatre since 2001. His first part in the company was as Mercutio in Roman Kozak's Romeo and Juliet. Since then he has played Karandishev in Without a Dowry, Brunello in Nights of Cabiria, Tito Merelli in Lend Me a Tenor and Benedick in Much Ado About Nothing. Mr. Arsentyev is starring in Evgeny Pisarev's recent production of The Marriage of Figaro as Count Almaviva. He has worked with Declan Donnellan previously, playing the part of Orsino in Twelfth Night.

#### IURII RUMIANTCEV (Escalus)

Mr. Rumiantcev graduated from the Russian Academy of Theatre Arts in 1964 and was employed by the Pushkin Theatre the same year. Mr. Rumiantcev has played in more than sixty productions for the theater, with roles including: Marek in The Good Soldier Schweik, Vozhak in The Optimistic Tragedy, Spiegelberg and Schufterle in The Robbers. Moiseika in Ward Number 6, Fedka and Lebedyakin in The Demons and Zemlyanika in The Government Inspector. Mr. Rumiantcev has taught at the Russian Academy of Theatre Arts since 2001.

#### ANDREI KUZICHEV (Angelo)

Mr. Kuzichev trained at the Russian Academy of Theatre Arts, and has since worked with major Moscow theater companies. He has been collaborating with the Centre of Drama and Directing of A.Kazantsev and M. Roschin since 1999, where he has played such parts as Gary in Shopping and Fucking and Maksim in Plastiscine, for which he received the Seagull Award for Best Actor. Mr. Kuzichev has starred in most of Declan Donnellan's Russian language productions: as Viola in Twelfth Night, Tuzenbach in Three Sisters, and as Ariel in The Tempest. Mr. Kuzichev is actively working in cinema with Russian directors who include Roman Balayan and Vladimir Mashkov. He teaches acting at the Moscow Art Theatre School,

#### ALEXANDER FEKLISTOV (Lucio)

Mr. Feklistov graduated from Moscow Art Theatre School in 1982. He has worked with major Moscow theater companies, including: Moscow Art Theatre, Stanislavsky Drama Theatre and Pushkin Theatre, as well as on many independent projects. He continues his relationship with Moscow Art Theatre by playing the part of Samuel Pickwick in The Pickwick Papers. Mr. Feklistov has been cast in all of Declan Donnellan's Moscowbased productions: Boris Godunov in Boris Godunov. Sir Toby in Twelfth Night, Verhsinin in Three Sisters, and Caliban in The Tempest. Mr. Matrosov graduated from Moscow Art Theatre School in 2003 and joined the Pushkin Theatre the same year, where he has played such roles as: Charles in Madame Bovary, Derjimorda in The Government Inspector, Tybalt in Romeo and Juliette, Flender in Bullets Over Broadway and Henry Saunders in Lend Me a Tenor.

**ALEXEY RAKHMANOV** (Pompey, Friar Peter) Mr. Rakhmanov studied acting at the Russian Academy of Theatre Arts under Mark Zakharov before training at Moscow Art Theatre School and then joining the Pushkin Theatre. His shows include: Grand Magia, The Good Person of Szechwan, The Marriage of Figaro and Much Ado About Nothing.

### ANNA KHALILULINA (Isabella)

Ms. Khalilulina graduated from the Schepkin Theatre School in 2009, where she was awarded a Golden Leaf award for Best Actress. She played Marina Mnishek in Declan Donnellan's Boris Godunov and Miranda in his

The Tempest. Ms. Khalilulina played the lead in the feature film To Hear the Sea and regularly acts for Russian television shows.

ELMIRA MIREL (Mariana, Mistress Overdone) Ms. Mirel graduated from the School of Choreography of Baku, majoring in folk dancing, before joining the Moscow Art Theatre School, where she first performed in the Pushkin Theatre production of Romeo and Juliette. She was then invited to play Rosa in Feydeau's Fitting Confusion and in Chekhov's short stories. For Marathon Theatre Company she played in Shaw's Pygmalion and Chekhov's A Guide for Those Wanting to Get Married. She works as a choreographer in film and television series. Ms. Mirel joined the Pushkin Theatre company in 2014.

ANASTASIA LEBEDEVA (Juliet, Francisca) Ms. Lebedeva joined the Pushkin Theatre after graduating from Moscow Art Theatre School in 2007. Her theater work includes The Mask in Turandot, Margaret in Much Ado About Nothing and Blanche Duval in The Lady of the Camellias. Since 2006, Ms. Lebedeva has starred in more than a dozen television series.

#### **DECLAN DONNELLAN** (Director)

Mr. Donnellan is joint Artistic Director of Cheek by Jowl. As Associate Director at the National Theatre his productions include: Fuenteovejuna, Sweeney Todd, The Mandate and both parts of Angels in America. Other productions include: Le Cid (Avignon Festival); The Winter's Tale (Maly Theatre of St. Petersburg); and Shakespeare in Love (West End). Mr. Donnellan's opera credits include Falstaff (Salzburg Festival). Ballet: Romeo and Juliet, Hamlet (Bolshoi), His film credits include Bel Ami. In 2009, Mr. Donnellan shared the Charlemagne Prize with Craig Ventner and Archbishop Tutu. His book. The Actor and the Target, was first published in Russian in 2000 and has subsequently appeared in fifteen languages

### NICK ORMEROD (Designer)

Mr. Ormerod is joint Artistic Director of Cheek by Jowl. His credits for the National Theatre include: Fuenteovejuna, Peer Gynt, Sweeney *Todd, The Mandate* and both parts of *Angels in America*. For the Royal Shakespeare Company, his credits include: The School for Scandal, King Lear (RSC Academy) and Great Expectations, which he also co-adapted. Other work includes: The Rise and Fall of the City of Mahogonny (English National Opera); Martin Guerre (Prince Edward Theatre); Hayfever (Savov Theatre): Antigone (The Old Vic): Falstaff (Salzburg Festival); and Shakespeare in Love (West End). Mr. Ormerod co-directed the film Bel Ami with Declan Donnellan.

KIRILL SBITNEV (Assistant Director) In 2007, Mr. Sbitnev graduated from the Saint Petersburg Academy of Theatre Arts. As an actor, he participated in the productions of 'APTO' Theatre in Moscow, including the parts of Vladimir Mayakovsky in Mistery-Bouffe and

**IRINA KASHUBA** (Choreographer) Ms. Kashuba graduated from Moscow State University of Culture and Art as a choreographer in 2003. As a performer she has participated in many musicals, which include: Twelve Chairs, Chicago, Beauty and the Beast and Zorro. Since 2008 Ms. Kashuba has worked for Stage Entertainment Russia as a resident choreographer, where she was an assistant choreographer on *The* Sound of Music. recipient of the Regional Theatre Tony Award. Its work has been recognized internationally with three of London's prestigious Laurence Olivier Awards, and by the Chicago theater community with over 75 Joseph Jefferson Awards for Artistic Excellence. Since the inception of the World's Stage Series in 2000, CST has hosted more than 30 iconic troupes, including: The Abbey Theatre (Dublin), Shakespeare's Globe Theatre (London), the Chekhov International Theatre Festival (Moscow) and La Comédie-Française (Paris). The works presented by these companies range from intimate one-man works, like South African Omphile Molusi's Itsoseng, to grand spectacles like the French troupe Ilotopie's Water Fools (Fous de Bassin), performed entirely atop the waters of Lake Michigan. CST has contributed to this exciting international exchange by sending some of its best works abroad, including: the Olivier Award-winning production of Stephen Sondheim's Pacific Overtures (2003); Henry IV, Parts 1 and 2, which marked CST's debut at the Royal Shakespeare Company in Stratfordupon-Avon (2006); and Othello: The Remix (2012), which debuted at Shakespeare's Globe in London, followed by a world tour to South Korea, Sydney, Poland and New Zealand.

SERGEY SKORNETSKIY (Lighting Designer) Mr. Skornetskiy graduated from the Moscow Art Theatre School in Lighting Design in 1995. He started working as a lighting technician in Tabakov's theater while studying, and went on to work there as a lighting designer after graduation. He has created lighting design for more than 60 theater shows for companies including Moscow New Opera, RAMT, Mayakovsky Theatre, Pushkin Theatre, and many others. Productions that Mr. Skornetskiy has worked on include: The Lower Depth, Idiot, Encore Van Gogh, Dangerous Liasons, Arcadia, Flight, The Government Inspector, Woe from Wit, Talents and Admirers and Ladies Night.

#### PAVEL AKIMKIN (Composer)

Mr. Akimkin graduated from music school as an accordionist. In 1998 he started at the Gnesin Academy of Music as the folk choir master, and in 2006 he graduated from the Russian Academy of Theatre Arts as an actor. In 2001 he met Vladimir Pankov while working at the Soglasie Center, and in 2006 he became a regular collaborator of SounDrama, where Pankov is the artistic director. Mr. Akimkin's theater credits include: Gogol, Evenings, Swedish Match, Romeo and Juliet, Grooms, Shukshin's Short Stories (Theatre of Nations): Morphine (Et Cetera Theatre): and Hot Heart (Theatre on Malaya Bronnaya). As a music director, he has worked on The Lady of the Camellias and on Mother Earth, both for the Pushkin Theatre.

In 1986, Russian theater director Lev Dodin invited Mr. Donnellan and Mr. Ormerod to visit his company in Leningrad. Ten years later, they directed and designed The Winter's Tale for the Maly Drama Theatre, which is still running in **TEATP ИМЕНИ** St. Petersburg. Throughout the 1990s the Russian Theatre **ПУШКИНА** Confederation regularly invited Cheek by Jowl to Moscow

as part of the Chekhov International Theatre Festival. This relationship intensified in 1999 when the festival, under the leadership of Valery Shadrin, commissioned Mr. Donnellan and Mr. Ormerod to form their own company of Russian actors in Moscow. This sister company performs in Russia and internationally, and its current repertoire includes *Boris Godunov* by Pushkin, Twelfth Night and The Tempest by Shakespeare, and Three Sisters by Anton Chekhov. Measure for Measure is Cheek by Jowl's first co-production with Moscow's Pushkin Theatre.
