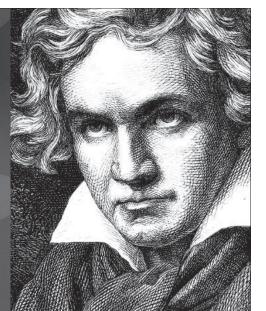


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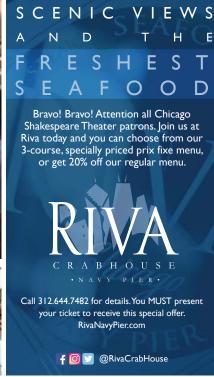

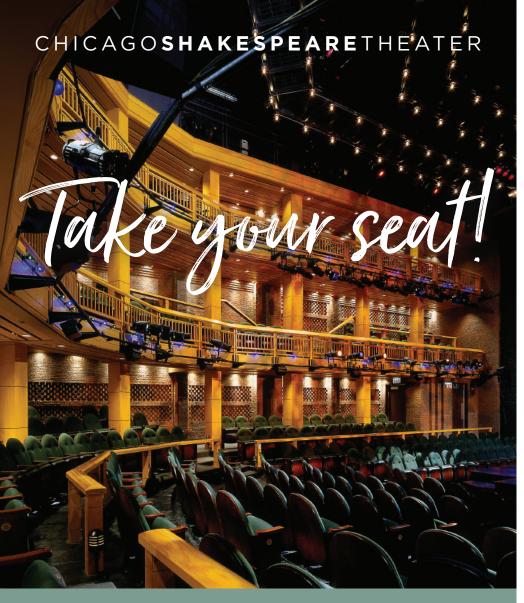

#### About CST

Under the leadership of Artistic Director Barbara Gaines and Executive Director Criss Henderson, Chicago Shakespeare has redefined what a great American Shakespeare theater can be—a company that defies theatrical category. This Regional Tony Award-winning theater's year-round season features as many as twenty productions and 650 performances-including plays, musicals, world premieres, family programming, and presentations from around the globe. The work is enjoyed by 225,000 audience members annually, with one in four under the age of eighteen. Chicago Shakespeare is the city's leading presenter of international work, and in touring its own productions across five continents has garnered multiple accolades, including the prestigious Laurence Olivier Award. Emblematic of its role as a global theater, the company spearheaded Shakespeare 400 Chicago, celebrating Shakespeare's legacy in a citywide. yearlong international arts and culture festival, which engaged more than one million people. The Theater's nationally acclaimed arts in literacy programs support the work of English and drama teachers, and bring Shakespeare to life on stage for tens of thousands of their students each school year. Over the summer, the company tours a professional production of Shakespeare's work, free for all, to neighborhood parks across the city. In 2017 the Theater unveiled The Yard at Chicago Shakespeare—with its innovative design that has changed the shape of theater architecture. #### On the Boards







Throughout the fall, student ensembles from fifty Chicago area high schools have participated in the second annual Chicago Shakespeare Slam, Through a slam-style showcase performance, teams from across the region came together to celebrate the power of Shakespeare and their own voices. Following a Saturday workshop, each team prepared two performance pieces to be presented at Regional Bouts: any Shakespeare scene from the canon. selected by the team: and a creative exploration inspired by a single play that the entire Slam community focuses on together-this year, Macbeth, the play that CST will stage for tens of thousands of students this winter. The top-scoring teams advance to perform in the Final Bout on December 10, held onstage in The Yard at Chicago Shakespeare, Above all, the Slam is an ensemble program that seeks to build community within and across schools.



Opening in The Yard at Chicago Shakespeare in February is the National Theatre of Great Britain's award-winning production of JB Priestlev's 1945 thriller. An Inspector Calls. One of Chicago Shakespeare's limited-run WorldStage presentations this season, it is helmed by internationally renowned director Stephen Daldry, whose genre-spanning career includes the hit Netflix series The Crown. Oscar-nominated films. and Tony Award-winning productions. First premiering in 1992, the production has since played to audiences around the world, making An Inspector Calls the longest-running revival of a play in history—amassing Olivier, Tony, Drama Desk, and Critics' Circle awards. Hailed by the UK's Evening Standard as "an epic for our epoch, a thrillingly physical piece of theatre—with the power to stir the heart as much as the mind," it runs February 19 through March 10.



Chicago Shakespeare is proud to present Compagnie Non Nova's L'après-midi d'un foehn Version 1 from France, in partnership with the Chicago International Puppet Theater Festival. The production runs January 23-27 on stage in The Yard at Chicago Shakespeare—quite literally: with the audience arranged on the stage itself, surrounding performer Jean-Louis Ouvard. In a mesmerizing piece of puppetry. Ouvard transforms ordinary plastic grocery bags into lifelike figures that take flight in an intoxicating visual ballet. The Chicago International Puppet Theater Festival is a biennial event that aims to establish Chicago as a prominent center for the art of puppetry through a curated series of performances and workshops across the city. As part of the inaugural Festival in 2015, CST presented Blind Summit's The Table, whose star Moses captured hearts around the city.

# nternationally acclaimed director Joe Dowling spoke to CST's staff when he visited Chicago to cast the production.

What do you look forward to in revisiting this play now in your career?

Joe Dowling: This is the tenth time I have directed this play! But every time, something happens in rehearsal and it makes me say, 'Oh, I didn't see that before.' Obviously, new actors bring new ideas, and what is always exciting about Shakespeare is how his work can be interpreted through different cultural moments. This play certainly has lots to say about battles for power involving gender and sexuality. It is also a celebration of theater itself—and that is something that warms my heart.

Along with *The Tempest* and *Love's Labor's Lost*, it appears that Shakespeare created the *Dream* without references to literary sources or earlier plays. In each, there is a play-within-a-play, where we watch amateur performers attempt to explore ideas about love and death through drama. I love the idea that Shakespeare offers us a glimpse into the special world of theater enthusiasts.

#### Can you talk about your inspiration for the overall design for the set?

The basic visual reference that Todd Rosenthal, our set designer, and I worked from is the work of Hieronymus Bosch, the sixteenth-century Dutch painter—and, specifically, his *Garden of Earthly Delights* with its mixture of beauty and cruelty. Todd has adapted it to our needs quite magnificently, and it is a great playground for all our different worlds.



#### What is this forest like?

It is a place of beauty, of conflict, of strange and magical happenings. At the start of our time in the forest, Titania and Oberon are almost in a civil war over the possession of a 'changeling child.' The unease and discord is being felt in the mortal world—as Titania reminds us in that prescient speech about climate—and infects all that happens in our play. The young lovers, fleeing a repressive law, find themselves at the mercy of the spirit world. Through their ordeal of that night, they find a new maturity and a different understanding of each other. In other words, they grow up!

#### Titania wants peace, harmony with the mortal world—and to be serenaded by her devoted fairies.

#### How do you envision the king and queen of the Fairies who inhabit this forest?

Oberon and Titania are deeply in love, but we find them in a crisis in their relationship—not only because of the child but also with jealousy over sexual affairs. While they are spirits, their language and their attitude is very human in its emotional and sexual references. This is a night forest and a place

of the imagination where, as Theseus puts it, 'how easy is a bush supposed a bear.' It is also filled with Puck, the goblin whose merry wanderings 'fright the maidens of the villagery,' and with the torment created by a fairy world out of order. Oberon is a mixture of tyrant and lover, equally powerful in both roles. Titania wants peace, harmony with the mortal world—and to be serenaded by her devoted fairies. Oberon's cruel trick leads to humiliation and distress for her. The task for the production is to reconcile their differences without letting Oberon completely off the hook for his bad behavior.

#### Can you talk about your decision to double the roles of Oberon and Titania with the actors who also play Theseus and Hippolyta?

Peter Brook was the first director to double these roles in his 1970 Royal Shakespeare Company production. By and large, it has been done ever since. There's clearly a link between the characters. It definitely makes sense from a *practical* point of view, and that may well have been Brook's intention.



Psychologically it makes sense, too, but I don't think one should draw too many parallels because of the differences.

#### And the Mechanicals—what role do they play in this story, imagined out of whole cloth by Shakespeare?

For those of us who believe that theater is an important part of any community, this group has a very special place in our hearts. The Mechanicals aren't clowns. It is essential that they are not patronized, that we accept that these are real people trying to do their dead-level best. They're not from some distant 'Ancient Athens'; they're from *here*. They're like any community theater group trying to put together a production: they've got to find their own props and their own bits-and-pieces of costumes. And their performance has to

feel like it's been put together in a hurry. Their competence as actors is certainly in question when they come to performing the "palpable gross" play for the Duke and Duchess. It is fascinating also to watch the group dynamics of this motley crew shift as personalities clash and tensions rise. Bottom is a wonderfully complex character; each of the amateur actors has a distinct personality that we are exploring in some detail.

#### What is it about your work that's so in sync with this particular script, making it a signature of your career?

I have always loved the play. I saw that famous Peter Brook production and it opened my eyes to the many possibilities of producing Shakespeare for a contemporary audience. As Ben Jonson said, he was 'not of an age, but for all time.' It is important that every new audience can see their own lives, emotions, and dreams in the work of this great genius. Through its powerful language, poetry, and hilarious action, every new production should speak of a world that is both exotic and familiar. That is our aim in this production and why I have

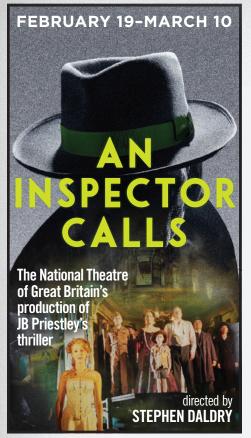

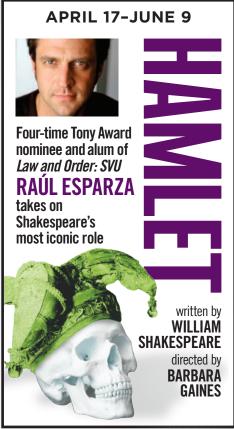

A MIDSUMMER NIGHT'S DREAM

#### Playgoer's Guide

#### THE STORY

In four days, Theseus, Duke of Athens, plans to marry Hippolyta, Queen of the Amazons—the warrior whom he has conquered in battle. As he anticipates his wedding, a high-ranking member of the Duke's court approaches Theseus on a family matter: Egeus's daughter Hermia refuses to marry Demetrius—her father's choice. Hermia professes her love for Lysander, and the Duke in reply gives her three choices: to marry Demetrius, become a nun, or die. She chooses instead her own path: to flee from the Athenian law with Lysander. Demetrius, tipped off by his former girlfriend Helena (who also happens to be Hermia's best friend), follows in hot pursuit. And where Demetrius goes, so goes the heartsick Helena.

All four head into the woods—right where the fairy king and queen are embroiled in relationship problems of their own. Enraged by Titania's devotion to a young human boy, Oberon commands Puck, his fairy servant, to retrieve the flower that will enchant his queen into falling madly in love with the first creature she encounters—whatever that may be. Seeing Helena in pursuit of Demetrius, Oberon takes pity on her and orders Puck to apply the flower's potent juice to the young man's eyes, too. But from Puck's vantage point, one Athenian looks pretty much the same as any other—and soon it will be Lysander, not Demetrius, who falls head over heels for Helena. And so it goes that the archrivals for Hermia's affections become archrivals for Helena instead.

That same night, a troupe of amateur actors heads into the woods—Athenian workers rehearsing a play that they hope to present on Theseus's wedding day. Among this motley crew, it takes Puck no time to target Nick Bottom as the perfect love match for the fairy queen, who will soon awake to dote upon this mortal—transformed, by Puck, into an ass. Love all around seems destined for disaster—until Oberon (and Theseus) step back in to set things aright.

#### ITS ORIGINS

Shakespeare almost never created his plots from whole cloth; instead, he typically borrowed from one or two primary sources: published histories, other plays, stories, or legend. *A Midsummer Night's Dream* is a notable exception. Here, Shakespeare wove material from a wide variety of sources—legend and folklore, mythology, Chaucer's *Canterbury Tales*, Plutarch's *Lives*, and Ovid's *Metamorphoses*—creating an original story completely of his own imagining. The characters of Theseus, from Greek mythology and Chaucer, along with Puck, the legendary sprite Robin Goodfellow from English folklore, would have been well known to Shakespeare's audiences: and Shakespeare's lovers were

inspired from the pastoral tradition, a popular genre characterized by an escape from the confines of society in favor of a life surrounded by nature. Scholars believe that Bottom and his crew are entirely original, inspired by the actors of the playwright's own company, including the beloved clown Will Kempe. The play was entered on the Stationers' Register on October 8, 1600, and first published that same year.

#### IN PERFORMANCE

There is no extant record of the first performances of A Midsummer Night's Dream. Based on the nature of its language and the play's style, in addition to some topical references in the script, this early comedy is usually dated between 1595 and 1596—approximately the same time that Shakespeare was writing Romeo and Juliet. For nearly 300 years, the play remained popular, though barely recognizable, as a romantic pastoral play, abridged and radically adapted both for the stage and in an array of music, opera, and fairy ballets. In 1914 British director Harley Granville Barker stunned critics and audiences by presenting the Dream with Shakespeare's script restored. Perhaps the most influential twentieth-century production came in 1970 when Peter Brook directed the play with the Royal Shakespeare Company, with its minimalist, brilliantly lit, white box set, and a cast of circus performer actors, flying from trapezes and balancing along the top edges of the walls. Joe Dowling's production marks Chicago Shakespeare Theater's fourth full-length production of A Midsummer Night's Dream. In the Theater's Inaugural Season on Navy Pier, Dowling first directed the play in CST's Courtyard Theater in 2000. A 2008 CST WorldStage production, led by the English director Tim Supple, was performed in eight different languages—half in English and half in the South Asian languages native to the performers. In 2012 Gary Griffin staged the Theater's third full-length production, after also directing the company's first abridged version of the play; since then, myriad abridged productions have followed for school and family audiences, as well as for Chicago Shakespeare in the Parks—including last summer's production, directed by Barbara Gaines.

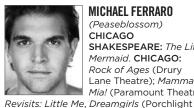

(Executive Director) is the executive director of Chicago Shakespeare and has produced the Theater's past twenty-nine seasons. Under his leadership,

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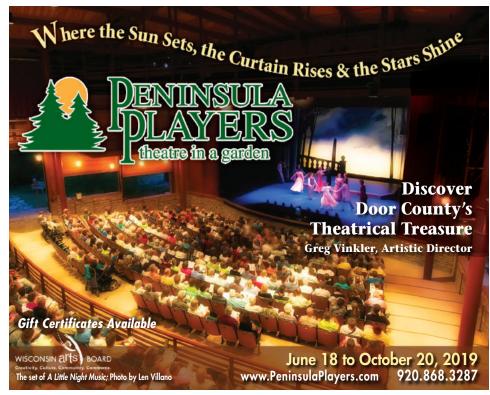

The same script through different lenses reveals itself in myriad ways—leaving us, the readers of text and performance, to think and rethink our own points of view. Such is the legacy that Shakespeare left us. We hope that our program notes enrich, deepen, and sometimes even challenge our audiences' experience with the production they witness.

# All Compact A Scholar's Perspective on A Midsummer Night's Dream

Spoiler alert: like most romantic comedies, A Midsummer Night's Dream ends in marriages: of Theseus, Duke of Athens, to Hippolyta, Queen of the Amazons; and of the two couples for whom the course of true love has not till now run smooth.

At the wedding feast Duke Theseus, reflecting on the wild night in the woods that has led up to these nuptials, melds madness, love, and art into a radiant reckoning that in many ways sums up the play:

The lunatic, the lover, and the poet Are of imagination all compact.

All three figures, Theseus is saying, are governed by imagination. As he goes on to explain, they each in their different ways see things that are not there: the madman dwells inside his hallucinations; the lover beholds in the beloved virtues and beauties that s/he does not actually possess; the poet revels in worlds that s/he has created from scratch—in the artistic power that can give "to airy nothing / A local habitation and a name."

Here near play's end, Shakespeare makes it easy for us to match up each of Theseus's categories with the passionate, hapless, often adorable characters we've been observing in action for a couple of hours: the quartet of lovers, lost in both the forest and their own roiling emotions, subject to forces beyond their control (parental disapproval, amorous elixirs). The temporarily lunatic Titania, Queen of the Fairies, driven so mad by a drug as to fall in love with Bottom the Weaver, half-ass, half-human, who crazily enough accepts her ardors as though they were his by natural merit. And—strangest match of all—the "poet" Peter Quince, carpenter and amateur playwright, who has come up with a script based on the tragic myth of Pyramus and Thisbe, to be rehearsed by his fellow tradesmen, and performed



(if they're lucky enough to get the gig) at the wedding feast that rounds out Shakespeare's larger play.

It's in the last of these categories—the poet as maker of something out of nothing that Shakespeare conducts his most intricate maneuvers. The link between lovers and madmen, after all, is long familiar: it's been a staple in love poems and pop songs for centuries. In Midsummer, it's forged primarily through supernatural enchantments: in the love-potion wielded by the fairy Puck, eager, airborne, and intermittently inept.

By contrast, Shakespeare presents the endeavors of the "poet"—the labors of Peter Quince and his companions—as anything but magical, as a matter of sweat and fears. of massive perspiration and minimal inspiration. Rehearsing Pyramus and Thisbe in the Athenian woods, these would-be players fret endlessly about how to shape their show's impact: how to prevent the women in the audience from being too frightened by the lion; how to make the moonlight convincing; how to help the spectators understand that a spackled human will impersonate a wall. For them, "imagination" is equal parts apprehension (fear of things going wrong) and ingenuity (tactics

for making things go right). When Puck, their amused but unseen onlooker, dubs them "rude mechanicals," the phrase makes two points: not only that in ordinary life these men labor with their hands, but also that here and now, before our eyes, they are working out the "machinery" of theater, the moves and mechanisms that make it work, as if drawing up the blueprints for the very first time.

Their naiveté makes them easy to love. We playgoers know the conventions of the playhouse so deeply that we tend to take them for granted. To watch those rules worked out and worked over anew, by baffled mortals intent on doing their theatrical best, is a piquant privilege.

That privilege, Shakespeare goes on to show, can entail delicious obligations of its own. When, at the wedding feast, Hippolyta worries that Quince's amateurs in their ineptitude will embarrass themselves and move their audience to nothing but ridicule, Theseus suggests to her a gentler, more capacious way of watching plays: "The best in this kind are but shadows; and the worst are no worse, if imagination amend them." Even the best performers ("this kind") are merely shadows (imperfect images, faint echoes), both of the characters they portray and of the perfection that their own performances might theoretically attain in some ideal world of perfect playacting. Hence, both the best players and the worst need our compassionate, cooperative imaginations to offset the shortfalls intrinsic to human imperfection.

And since, for Shakespeare and his audience, the word "kind" also meant "Nature," life on earth. Theseus's pronouncement echoes wider; the imaginative compassion we bestow on bad actors, we should bestow on muddle-minded humanity as well. Theater provides a micro-model for human empathy. If all the world's a stage, we would do well to look kindly on our fellow-players.

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Theseus speaks the words; Hippolyta lives their truth. As she watches poor Pyramus, poorly performed, lament the death of his beloved, the hitherto cynical Queen of the Amazons finds herself moved not to laughter but to tears: "Beshrew my heart, but I pity the man." Bottom the Weaver, playing Pyramus with a mix of overweening confidence and underwhelming finesse, has snagged the heart of a second queen.

As well he might. When Theseus averred that madmen, lovers, and poets are "of imagination all compact," he means both that all three figures are "entirely composed" of imagination (and of little or nothing else); and that by dint of their condition, they are intrinsically united in a league (a compact) grounded in shared temperament and experience.

By the end of Pyramus and Thisbe, and of A Midsummer Night's Dream. too, Shakespeare has managed to increase that league's membership many times over. The fairies, literally made of and by imagination, throughout his play operated as audience, at once involved and aloof: they have treated the befuddled as objects of empathy, and as rich sources of entertainment. And we, watching the fairies monitor the mortals, who in their turn watch Quince's play, occupy the outermost circle of observation and delight.

In effect, the rude mechanicals and Shakespeare, the master craftsman who created them ex nihilo, have reacquainted us with the workings of our own imaginations: of how we think and feel when, in watching a play, we collaborate with playwright, players, and all the mighty mechanicals behind the scenes (designers, crew, etc.) to make something spellbinding out of nearly nothing.

In the end, Theseus's ample compact encompasses us too. The best in our kind are but shadows, and the worst are no worse if imagination amend them.



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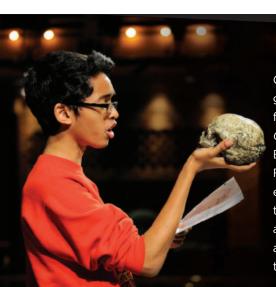
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
